Content (topic and contents)	The "Inequality and Diversity" module teaches students about the causes and effects of social, political and economic inequalities, as well as the significance of diversity in various social contexts. Students learn methodological skills to analyze and evaluate phenomena of inequality and diversity using qualitative and quantitative research approaches. Furthermore, the module provides knowledge of political science and sociological theories of inequality and the evaluation of strategies to promote equal opportunities and inclusion.

Content (topic and contents)	The "Digital Societies" module imparts knowledge about the theoretical and empirical approaches to analyzing digitalization and its effects on politics and society. Topics such as the digitalization of work, digital inequalities, algorithmic governance, social media and their role in political discourse and the influence of digital technologies on democracy will be discussed. Students learn about various methodological approaches, such as computational social sciences and network analysis, applying these to their own questions.

Content (topic and contents)	The module "International Politics and Conflict" provides students with comprehensive knowledge of the theories, dynamics and challenges of international politics, as well as the causes and consequences of local and global conflicts. Participants will acquire methodological skills to analyze international relations and conflicts by applying qualitative and quantitative research methods. By examining the latest research findings and case studies, participants learn how to analyze complex conflicts. In addition, the topics covered in the module promote students' ability to reflect on existing explanatory approaches.
