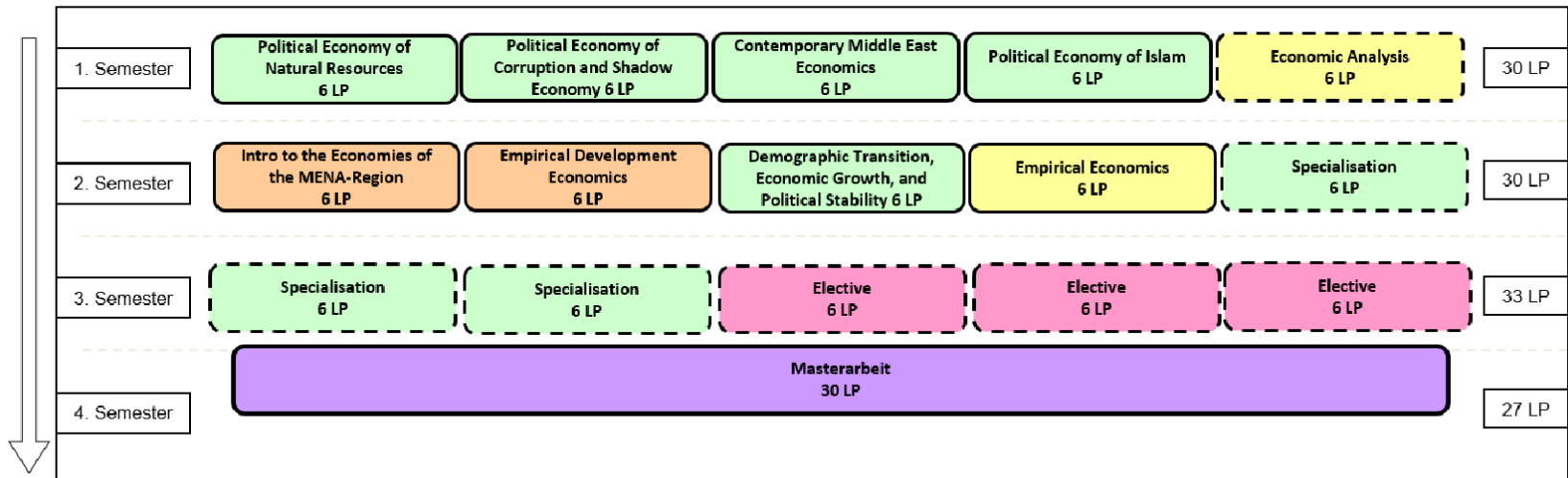

Structure of the EMEA programme

Master Thesis
[30]

You have **six months to complete the thesis**. The topic must have a relevance for the MENA region.

To **register the thesis**, you must have **acquired 48 ECTS** in the study areas Introduction to the MENA Region, Economic Analysis, MENA Economics, and Specialisation.

When the time for the thesis approaches, **present your ideas to potential supervisors** and check with them the project's feasibility.

Once you have a supervisor, **approach the Examinations Office** to officially **register your thesis**.

- One course with 6 ECTS from the study area “Economic Analysis”, for example “Microeconomics”, “Economics of Civil and Criminal Law”, “Microeconometrics”, or “Policy Evaluation: Conducting Field Experiments”.
- Alternative course selection is possible, but please keep in mind that not all courses are offered each semester. Therefore, we recommend that you first study the mandatory courses.

Grading and exam regulations

You will receive grades according to the following scale:

- 13-15: Very good
 - 10-12: Good
 - 7-9: Satisfactory
 - 5-6: Sufficient
 - 0-4: Fail

- In Marburg, **marks** are given within an interval ranging from **0 (lowest level) to 15 (highest level) points**.
 - You have the right to take a **look at your marked exams**, and if you have a potential grading question, you will have the chance to ask the examiners for more clarifications.

Grading and exam regulations

- There are usually two **exam periods** per semester.
 - First sittings are usually held immediately after the lecture period ends.
 - Second sittings are held towards the end of the official semester.
- You **must register for exams** in order to take them. If you **fail to register** within the registration period, you are **not allowed to sit** the exam. The registration period for **School of Business and Economics (FB02)** is available on the [website](#). In FB02, you will be automatically registered for seminar papers and presentations.
- Schedules are available on the website of the [Examinations Office](#), and you can find all information on dates of exams for each class in the [Marvin portal](#).

Grading and exam regulations

- **Please be aware that every faculty has their own rules and deadlines regarding registrations for examinations.** Since summer 2025, following rule applies in the **School of Business and Economics (FB02)**:
 - **Registration for examinations and coursework (Prüfungs- und Studienleistungen) in School of Business and Economics is mandatory** and takes place online via *Marvin* during the respective registration periods.
 - Coursework and semester-long assessments such as **term papers or presentations** are registered implicitly, that means, the **examination registration happens automatically when you enroll in the course**, provided that the selected module is part of your curriculum. Final exams at the end of the semester, however, **must be registered explicitly**.
 - Please always check whether your registration has been completed correctly. **Participation in an exam is only possible if you are officially registered.**

Grading and exam regulations

Failing exams

- It is possible to take up to three re-sits of one exam. Failing the third re-sit exam in an obligatory module (failing 4 times in total in one obligatory module) implies being ejected from the EMEA programme!
- Modules can consist of various exam types, e.g., an essay and an exam. It might be the case that the module grade is an average of the exam and essay grade.

Re-enrolment

- To be eligible to participate in exams, you must be enrolled in the university. You will have to **re-enroll** at Philipps-Universität Marburg every semester by paying the [semester fee](#).

Re-enrolment

Re-enrolment

- To be eligible to participate in exams, you must be enrolled in the university. You will have to **re-enroll** at Philipps-Universität Marburg every semester by paying the [semester fee](#).
- If you reside **abroad during the third semester** you can pay a **reduced enrollment fee**. You must first re-enroll by paying the total fee and then request a refund.
- **Under certain conditions**, a part of the semester fee can be reimbursed, please follow procedure mentioned here: <https://www.uni-marburg.de/de/studium/service/sbs/studium/erstsemester/ticket-rueck>

General course organization

Attending courses

- You should register for **lectures** and **seminars**. **This can be done in the MARVIN Portal (marvin.uni-marburg.de)**
- **Participation** in lectures is **strongly recommended**. In **seminars**, you **are expected to participate** in sessions, especially in block seminars.

Course material and information

- **Course news and material** will be provided via the learning platform **ILIAS**. Registration may be automatic when you register through MARVIN.
- Otherwise, you will need an additional **password to register** for a course, which is normally given in the first lecture.

Study abroad: earning credits abroad

- Approach the Transfer Coordinator **Mr. Lawrence Brown** with information about the **contents and workload** of courses that you will study abroad. <https://www.uni-marburg.de/en/fb02/studying/examinations-office/recognition/foreign-credit-transfer>
- The better the match between foreign and EMEA modules, the higher the chances for transferring credits. You can use any EMEA module, including interdisciplinary modules.
- Back in Marburg, you will have to hand in the original transcript to finalise the credit and grade transfer.

Study abroad: earning credits abroad

- **Important Notice:**
 - For the semester abroad, it is expected that you complete the equivalent of one semester (at least), which would require 30 ECTS.
 - Since the EMEA Study Guidelines only permit 18 ECTS as electives, you should plan to take at least two courses (for 12 ECTS) as part of your specialization during your semester abroad.
 - Alternatively, you could continue the missing credits when you return to Marburg, however that may require you to remain beyond the recommended 4 semesters in total for your degree.

Study abroad: planning reliability

- In certain ways, you will begin your study abroad experience in Marburg...
- The foreign university might release the academic calendar or course programme only on short notice.
- Maybe the only way to get a learning agreement is to leave for the stay abroad and showing-up in person at the partner university.
- Please adjust your expectations and be prepared to experience some frictions. **Gathering information, e.g., from prior exchange students, will help you to anticipate difficult issues and deal with them better!**
- We will provide you with support in case of problems.

Altogether, there are **96 alumni** from more than **ten** different countries; **46 per cent of them are women**. Evaluation of 75 students in our alumni network in 2021 revealed that:

- 89.6 % of graduates were able to find a job within one year of graduation.
- 9 % continued studying a PhD programme after graduation.
- graduates can be found in many sectors such as consulting (40.3 %), finance (17.9 %), academia (13.4 %), ministries (11.9 %), as well as different other industries (13.4 %).

According to an alumni survey in 2013:

- 73% of alumni found employment within six months after graduation.
- 82% of alumni established a career strongly linked to MENA economics and business.
- 94% of alumni would recommend the programme to a friend or colleague.

Job prospects and further information

- **German language courses** can be taken in addition to the regular curriculum at the language centre (for a small fee).
- As part of **your electives**, you can opt for **CNMS's language courses**, e.g., in Arabic, Persian, Turkish.
- You can find literature, including electronic literature, and data using the library catalogue **OPAC**.
- **Marvin** allows you to manage your data and to request letters, e.g., to confirm your enrolment and gives information about courses
- **ILIAS** gives you access to course news and materials.

Job prospects and further information

- The Center for University Sports offers **sports courses** every semester. You can try out the courses during the first week of lectures. Just show up and see if you like it. You can register for a small fee. Note that some courses are highly demanded.
- The **student canteen** (Mensa) and **cafés** offer **affordable** snacks, meals and drinks.
- As a **student**, you can get **discounts** when visiting museums, cinemas, etc.
- Your **student ID** is a generous **flat fee public transportation ticket**. You can make trips to Frankfurt, Heidelberg, Kassel, etc., and use the bus or metro services without further charges.

Accommodation in Marburg

- Basically, there are two accommodation types, which have important differences in terms of the EMEA service and support offered:
- **1. Private accommodation** is offered by actors on the private housing market. Incoming EMEA students can search the private housing market by themselves. No service or support can be offered with private accommodation by the EMEA Team.
- **2. Public accommodation** is provided by the student union of Marburg (Studierendenwerk Marburg). You must apply for public accommodation online on the website of the Studierendenwerk: <https://studierendenwerk-marburg.de/en/living/online-application/> . The waiting time for a place in the dorm can be 6-12 months. Nevertheless, you should apply and follow-up regularly. Sometimes you might get a place after a couple of weeks.

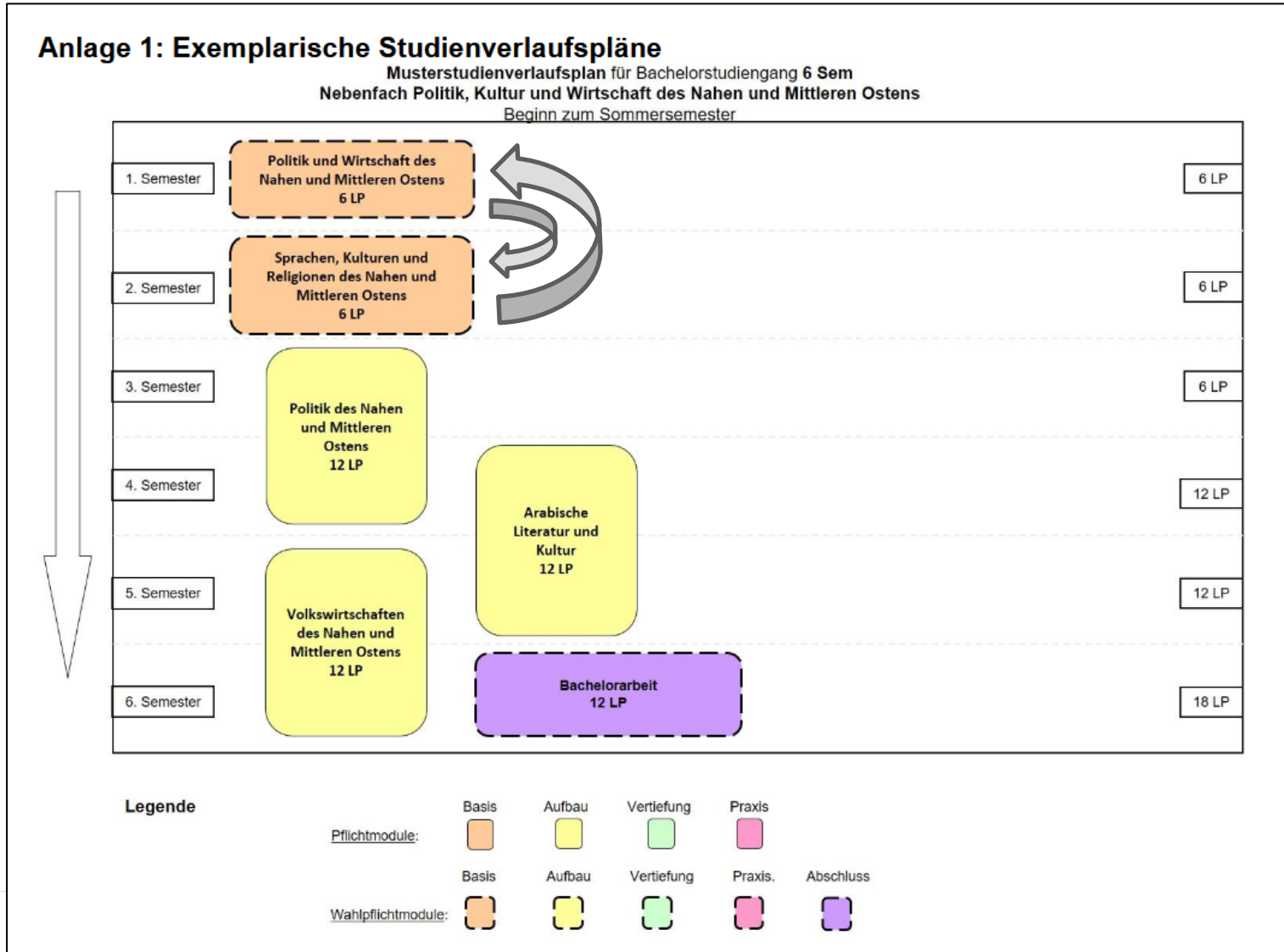
