



LV-04-a50-047: <u>B-AOW1-Seminar B: Sustainable consumer behaviour</u>

Responsible: Edward Clarke

- Climate change, environmental protection, sustainability... psychology has a lot to contribute to this topic. The way we deal with food, clothing, money and energy, for example, or more generally: the form of our economic activity has a decisive influence on how sustainably we live. Therefore, economic psychology also has important contributions to make to a transformation of society towards greater sustainability. This seminar will take a closer look at people in their role as consumers, investors, and citizens with regard to theoretical explanations, empirical findings and intervention approaches. Furthermore, we will discuss and debate broader conceptual problems such as the role of the individual in system-level environmental solutions. In small groups, the following topics can be deepened, for example:
- Consumption (e.g. food, clothing)
- Energy transition (e.g. acceptance of renewable energies)
- Investment/Divestment
- Citizen behaviour

Format of teaching and learning, type of event

This block seminar will take place in presence. Typically, each class will involve discussion of a topic with reference to a research article. Activities and group discussions will scaffold the learning of class content.



LV-04-a50-029 <u>B-VELPa-Seminar C: Migration and human</u> <u>development</u>

Responsible: Prof. Dr. Martin Pinquart

- The seminar applies main topics in the field of developmental psychology to young people with migration background, focusing on the situation of Germany and other countries.
- In Germany, about 20% of the citizens have a migration background, meaning that they are foreigners, were born outside of Germany, of have at least one parent who has been born outside Germany. The percentage is higher in children and adolescents than in older age groups. In the first part of the seminar, we will discuss whether and how the psychological development of children with and without migration background differs, for example with regard to success in school, language development, social integration, and problem behavior. Factors will be identified that explain the observed differences. In the second part of the seminar, we will discuss interventions aimed at promoting a positive development of children and adolescents with migration background (e.g., in kindergarten, schools, families, on in the whole society). Amongst others, we will discuss whether mainstream programs for young people in general are as successful in children or adolescents with migration background and how specific interventions could be developed that focus on the risk factors and resources of children with migration background.



LV-04-c90-019 M-WPa-Seminar: Diversity Responsible: Frank Eckerle

- One of the most pressing challenges for societies today is to handle diversity within and across their borders. For example, today about 20% of all individuals living in Germany have a migration background. In addition to the fact that migration is changing the composition of a society, it usually comes along with conflicts between societal members, such as stereotypes, prejudice and discrimination. This is part of our daily life. However, apart from diversity based on ethnic origin, a group of people can be diverse with respect to various characteristics like culture, religion, gender, age etc. Although diversity is often regarded as a challenge, it is also an opportunity allowing cultural exchange and broadening creative capacities. This seminar will examine the social psychological factors involved in the challenges and opportunities of diversity, with an applied focus on selected cases and contexts (e.g., cooperation and conflict in multicultural teams, internationalization of universities, gender pay gap, religious discrimination on the labor market). We will cover relevant theoretical bases, possible intervention strategies, as well as empirical findings for each case.
- A list of relevant literature will be shared and criteria for assessment will be discussed in the first session of the seminar.



Theoretical Neuroscience

Responsible: Prof. Dr. Dominik Endres

- The students know the modern standard models of theoretical neuroscience, with a focus on the connection of different levels of description. They understand through which abstraction steps neuron models can be derived from the electrodynamic and thermodynamic basics of biophysics. They can connect these neurons into networks, construct these networks with respect to a question and learn these networks. Normative models such as Bayesian Brain and Optimal Feedback Control Theory of motor control are understood.
- In addition to the theoretical analysis, the students master the handling and creation of simulation software for the models addressed in the lecture. Through the application of the programming language Python in the exercise, the students master its basics.







During the first few weeks of the semester:


Last step:


